IN A NUTSHELL:

Wenatchee wraps up a three-in-three weekend with a Vancouver Giants team in its own hunt for playoff positioning.

THE SCENE-SETTER:

Win or lose, the Wild continue to add to their point total in the race for the Western Conference's final playoff spot - Wenatchee erased a three-goal deficit in Portland for the second time this year, but ended with a 4-3 overtime loss at the Winterhawks Saturday. Kyle Chyzowski opened the scoring with a shorthanded marker at 8:47 of the first period, putting away a rebound off an initial shot from Josh Zakreski. The Winterhawks extended their lead on a drive to the net by Joel Plante at 9:18 of the second period, and Chyzowski hit the net at 13:12 on a one-timer following a Carter Sotheran takeaway. Wenatchee got its first goal on the power play with 1:58 left in the period, with some help from a video review - Reid Andresen's shot on the post was snared by Ondrej Stebetak, but his mitt was already over the goal line, putting the Wild within two. A 2-on-5 goal on the penalty kill from Miles Cooper gave the Wild a chance with 9:07 to play, and they erased the lead with a toss from Eastyn Mannix along the point wall with 4:33 left, that clipped Zane Saab's stick on the way to the net. Chyzowski completed the hat trick 41 seconds into overtime by slipping one through Alex Garrett, who made 26 saves but narrowly missed his first win with the Wild. Cooper and Saab each finished with a goal and an assist - the Wild went 1-for-3 on the power play and were perfect on three penalty kills.

KNOW YOUR FOE:

Vancouver makes the trip down to Town Toyota Center after stumbling in overtime against Kelowna Saturday at home, 4-3 - after a scoreless first period that saw the Giants take a 15-7 advantage on shots, Tyus Sparks gave the hosts a 1-0 lead 6:34 into the second. Kelowna responded with three goals before the intermission, starting with a shorthanded goal from Hiroki Gojsic at 10:55. Goals on back-to-back shifts from Dawson Gerwing and Will Sharpe put the Rockets ahead 3-1 at the break, but Tyler Thorpe cut the Kelowna lead to one at the 20-second mark of the third and Colton Roberts wiped away the lead with 8:20 to play. Sharpe's second goal of the game put it away for the Rockets 29 seconds into overtime, ending a 15-game losing streak for Kelowna. Ryan Lin remains one of the league's highest-scoring rookies with 43 points, and his 38 assists ranks second among first-year WHLers, while Mazden Leslie's 16 goals and 62 points are near the top of the league leaderboard among blueliners. Though seventh in the Western Conference, the Giants are just five points back of Prince George for home-ice advantage in the opening round of the WHL playoffs, with a dozen games to go for each team.

SEEKING THE CENTURY MARK:

With 12 games to go, Miles Cooper is approaching the century mark for his career, posting his 94th points Saturday with a power play assist and a shorthanded goal. With 47 points, he now sits only two points off Evan Friesen's team scoring pace as well.

SHORTHANDED SHUTDOWN:

Wenatchee has steadily crept back up past the 80-percent mark on the penalty kill for the season, and has consistently remained among the top third of teams in the WHL in that department, moving back into the top five this weekend. The Wild have gone nine straight games without allowing multiple power play goals, going 30-for-34 (88.2 percent) on the kill in that stretch with three shorthanded goals.

NOT SHORT ON SCORING:

The Wild have revved up their offense on the penalty kill of late, posting their third shorthanded goal of the month on Saturday. Miles Cooper sent home his second shorthanded goal of the season in the second period Saturday, matching Evan Friesen and Tye Spencer, who scored the previous two this month.

STATE OF PLAY:

The battle continues for the final Western Conference playoff spot, with three teams in the heat of the battle - with 46 points, the Wild climbed past Kamloops Saturday, and sit four points behind Seattle for the eighth and final playoff spot in the Western Conference. Kamloops has one additional win compared to Wenatchee, giving them the league's primary tiebreaker for the time being - Kelowna is still on the board with 40 points. The teams are chasing a Seattle group that has won seven of its last 10, and 11 in its last 16. Other than a March 12 game at the Blazers, Wenatchee is out of head-to-head competition against the final four teams in the Western Conference's playoff mix. The Wild have earned points in five of their last six games, matching the longest such stretch of the season from November 2 to 20.

FIRST IMPRESSIONS:

Last season was Wenatchee's first as a WHL club, after the Valley hosted teams in the British Columbia Hockey League and North American Hockey League from 2008 to 2023. The team made a strong first impression, winning 34 games and taking fourth place in the Western Conference standings, earning home-ice advantage in the first round of the WHL playoffs and taking the Kelowna Rockets to six games.

LET'S GO CAMPING:

Two current Wenatchee players and two graduates from the 2023-24 team were selected to attend National Hockey League rookie camps ahead of this year's NHL preseason – **Miles Cooper** and defenseman **Josh Fluker** both earned selections to the Colorado Avalanche camp – both were also listed in the final NHL Central Scouting rankings for the 2023-24 season. Cooper and Fluker were both joined by **Briley Wood** at Avalanche camp, and 2023-24 Wild defenseman **Graham Sward** was invited to the Winnipeg Jets' camp. Sward finished with 81 points last season, tying the organization's one-year-old record for points by a defenseman, and was named a finalist for the WHL's Bill Hunter Memorial Trophy after winning the U.S. Division's Defenseman of the Year award.

ON TO THE PROS:

Three Wild players from last year have moved on to the professional ranks – defenseman **Karter Prosofsky** landed a contract in Italy for this season, and is playing with the Alps Hockey League's Gherdeina club. **Briley Wood** earned an invite out of rookie camp with the Colorado Avalanche, and was subsequently assigned to the Utah Grizzlies of the ECHL. **Graham Sward** also earned a pro contract, signing with the AHL's Manitoba Moose and spending the first part of this season with Norfolk of the ECHL. **Conor Geekie** and **Matt Savoie** spent time with Wenatchee before being dealt in midseason trades – Geekie is now a full-time forward for the NHL's Tampa Bay Lightning, while Savoie is with the AHL's Bakersfield Condors.

SEEING STARS:

One team award-winner remains with the Wild for the 2024-25 season after an outstanding season in 2023-24. **Miles Cooper** was selected as Wenatchee's Rookie of the Year thanks to his 18 goals and 28 assists over 65 contests.

THE 700 CLUB:

Head coach **Don Nachbaur** finds himself within sight of Western Hockey League history, reaching a major career milestone on November 20, earning his 700th career WHL victory against the Kelowna Rockets. Topping the WHL's all-time wins list is Don Hay, who won 750 games for Kamloops, Tri-City and Vancouver over a 19-year period, and is back with the Blazers in his third year as the club's associate coach. Just behind Hay at 742 career wins is Ken Hodge, who spent 20 years as a WHL head coach with the original Edmonton Oil Kings and the Portland Winterhawks. Nachbaur is in his 20th season as a WHL head coach, with all of the previous 19 seasons spent with teams in Washington state.

THE POINT OF IT ALL IS...:

This season, four players have achieved the career 100-point mark for their WHL careers while in a Wenatchee uniform – **Evan Friesen** scored his 100th point on November 8, while **Reid Andresen**, picked up his 100th WHL point on November 17 after scoring 86 points with the Medicine Hat Tigers. In-season acquisition **Deagan McMillan** posted 90 points in three years with the Tri-City Americans and became the next Wild player to get to 100 on New Year's Eve. It wouldn't take much of a jump from last season for **Miles Cooper** to get there, either – he notched 46 points last season, and entered the season needing 52 points to reach the century mark. Prior to his trade to Victoria on January 1, **Kenta Isogai** was the first to reach that milestone on October 26 at Everett.

TIME TO PLAY THE GAME:

Six Wenatchee players have passed milestones for their appearances in the Western Hockey League this year, starting with **Dawson Seitz** – his first game of the season on September 21 was also his 150th in the WHL. **Seth Tansem** played in his 100th career game on October 11, while **Miles Cooper** achieved his feat with a 100th career appearance on December 7 and **Evan Friesen** appeared in his 200th game with the club the following night. **Maddix McCagherty** played in his 100th WHL game on January 3, followed by **Reid Andresen**, with his 250th game on January 18 at Tri-City. Wenatchee saw two such milestones on January 31, as **Deagan McMillan** made his 200th WHL appearance and **Luka Shcherbyna** stepped on the ice for his 100th WHL game, followed by **Eastyn Mannix's** 100th game the following night in Prince Albert. Prior to his acquisition by the Calgary Hitmen, goaltender **Daniel Hauser** made his 150th WHL appearance on December 28.

BACK IN OUR NCAA ERA:

Forward **Shaun Rios** committed to Lindenwood University in St. Louis, Missouri while with the Shattuck-St. Mary's prep program in Faribault, Minnesota, while **Brendan Dunphy**, **Morgan Hackman** and **Lukas McCloskey** all came to the Wild with Division I commitments in hand following stints in the British Columbia Hockey League. CHL players were granted NCAA eligibility on November 7.

POW!:

Evan Friesen was recognized for his exploits in a four-game run from December 31 to January 5, earning Wenatchee's first weekly honor of the year with a Tempo WHL Player of the Week award. He notched a pair of assists in Tuesday's 6-1 New Year's Eve rout of the Kelowna Rockets, but his two goals and an assist in a Saturday victory at the Portland Winterhawks included Wenatchee's first penalty shot goal as a WHL club, and his four-goal, one-assist game the next day at Tri-City tied a career scoring high, and marked his first career four-goal game and the first this year for the Wild.



HEAD COACH DON NACHBAUR

The Wenatchee Wild are excited to welcome Don Nachbaur to the Wild family for his first season as the team's head coach in 2024-25. Nachbaur comes to Wenatchee after serving the past three seasons as an American Hockey League assistant coach in the Calgary Flames organization, most recently for the Calgary Wranglers & previously the Stockton Heat.

A native of Kitimat, British Columbia, Nachbaur has built an extensive and decorated coaching resume following a 15-year professional playing career. Prior to moving into the pro ranks, he played two seasons in the WHL with the Billings Bighorns, scoring 67 goals and 146 points from 1977 to 1979. He still shares the WHL record with a five-goal playoff game in 1978. Nachbaur was selected by the Hartford Whalers in the third round of the 1979 National Hockey League draft and played in nearly 900 professional contests, including 223 NHL games for the Whalers, Edmonton Oilers and Philadelphia Flyers. He also claimed an AHL Calder Cup in 1988 as a member of the Hershey Bears.

During a 30-year coaching career, Nachbaur has guided teams at the highest levels of the sport, including eight seasons as an assistant in the NHL and AHL, and two years as a head coach in Europe. He is also a proven winner as a Western Hockey League head coach and is especially familiar with the league's U.S. Division, with 19 seasons of experience as a bench boss with the Seattle Thunderbirds, Tri-City Americans and Spokane Chiefs. The third-winningest head coach in WHL history, Nachbaur earned his 700th WHL victory November 20, 2024 at the Kelowna Rockets, and has earned three Dunc McCallum Memorial Trophies as the WHL's Coach of the Year – he is the only coach in Canadian Hockey League history to earn Coach of the Year honors for three different CHL teams. He has also enjoyed international success behind the bench, serving as an assistant coach for Canada at the 2012 World Junior Championships, and winning gold as an assistant coach for the Canadian under-18 team at the 1999 Nations Cup and 2011 Ivan Hlinka Memorial Tournament.

Nachbaur has family ties to the city of Wenatchee and the Wild organization, with son Daniel playing for the Wild in the British Columbia Hockey League in 2015-16 before embarking on a four-year NCAA playing career at UMass-Boston. Don and his wife Kim have two adult children, Sydney and Daniel.
