### IN A NUTSHELL:

Wenatchee flips the calendar to a new month, and looks to flip its results as well.

### THE SCENE-SETTER:

A defensive battle between the Wild and Tri-City gave way to a 13-second break in the dam last Saturday in a 3-1 home loss to the Ams, the sixth consecutive one- or two-goal game in the series. Savin Virk's takeaway at the Tri-City blue line allowed him to race in and pitch a backhand shot over the shoulder of **Tobias Tvrznik** to give Tri-City its first goal 7:49 into the second period. 13 seconds later, Aden Bouchard carved his way through the defense and slipped a shot through for a two-goal Ams lead. The Wild struck with 9:12 left in the game, when **Josh Toll** found **Aiden Grossklous** for a backdoor one-timer to trim the lead to 2-1. A strong third-period push yielded no further results, though, and Connor Dale iced the game by outrunning the Wenatchee backcheck to the empty net with 19 seconds left. Tvrznik made 17 saves and the teams combined to go 10-for-10 on the penalty kill, but Saturday's game marked the sixth straight meeting in Wenatchee in which Tri-City earned at least one standings point.

### KNOW YOUR FOE:

After winning nine of 11, the Blades have cooled off along with the weather in the Pacific Northwest, with four losses in five games on their first U.S. Division road trip in two years. Tristen Doyle sent the Blades to the dressing room with momentum on a power play goal with 18 seconds to go in the first period Friday, but the Seattle Thunderbirds put the hammer down with five goals in the third period en route to a 5-1 win. Antonio Martorana scored two goals just 2:15 apart, tying things up 81 seconds into the third, and earning the eventual winner at 3:36 of the period. He would add an assist, while Coster Dunn finished with three assists and Ashton Cumby took home two of his own. Doyle extended his scoring streak to four straight games, while Brayden Klompke and Jordan Martin find themselves in a nine-way logjam for sixth in the WHL in scoring among defensemen. Friday's loss was Saskatoon's first when leading after two periods, after winning the first seven in that situation.

### WE C YOU THREE:

Wenatchee has three players on NHL Central Scouting's preliminary Players to Watch list ahead of the NHL Draft this coming summer, with all receiving "C" grades as likely fourth- or fifth-round draft picks. Forward **Caelan Joudrey** was announced to the list last Monday, along with goaltender **Tobias Tvrznik** and defenseman **Darian Rolsing**, earned "C" ratings from NHL Central Scouting, projected as fourth- or fifth-round draft picks this coming summer. The last time the Wild or ICE team had three players on the watch list was the 2019-20 season.

### A GRADE "A" CHANCE:

**Boston Tait** will be absent for a short spell after being called to join Canada's best Under-17 hockey players as part of the World Under-17 Hockey Challenge in Truro, Nova Scotia, and he was announced Saturday morning as one of the team's alternate captains for the tournament. Tait will play for the Canada Red team, and is one of 19 WHL players to be chosen for the tournament. The 44 players picked to represent Canada came from a pool of 80 players, including Tait, who earned invitations to Canada's U17 Program of Excellence summer camp. Two pool-play games await Sunday against Finland and Tuesday against the United States, before three days' worth of place games to determine the finish for the six competing teams.

### KILLER INSTINCT:

The Wild penalty kill continues to be among the WHL's best, with six kills in a row - the club has gone five straight games without giving up multiple power play goals, completing 21 of its last 23 kills. The penalty kill has climbed to 87.5 percent for the season, tied for second in the league.

### CC TO THE WW:

Wenatchee completed its first in-season trade of 2025-26 this week, sending a 2029 draft pick to the Spokane Chiefs in exchange for 2007-born defenseman **Caden Campion** - the second-year junior blueliner played six games in the Lilac City, registering a goal against the Wild on October 10. He split the 2024-25 season in the BCHL with Chilliwack and Alberni Valley, and led his Los Angeles Jr. Kings club to a national 150 title in 2023.

## THIRD TIME'S THE CHARM:

The Wild organization has its eye on a return to the Western Hockey League playoffs in the Wenatchee Valley's third WHL season, after a near miss a year ago. Wenatchee closed out 2024-25 with a 23-36-8-1 record, taking ninth in the 11-team Western Conference, and did so following a second half with razor-thin margins – in their last 30 games, the Wild dropped 14 games by only a one- or two-goal margin, and went to overtime in five of six games at the middle of February. The team that caught them did so after catching fire in their second half – Seattle claimed the final playoff spot with 18 wins after January 10, including wins in six of their last eight games.

## LET'S GO CAMPING:

Current Wenatchee player **Blake Vanek** earned a spot on the Ottawa Senators' training camp roster this fall after taking part in the Sens' rookie camp. Another player who started 2024-25 with the Wild, **Kenta Isogai**, earned a training camp slot with the Los Angeles Kings after being picked up by the team's American Hockey League affiliate, the Ontario Reign, late in the summer.

## DRAFT DAY:

The Wild landed on the National Hockey League draft board twice in late June, with one incoming Wenatchee player selected alongside an outgoing standout. Forward **Blake Vanek** was taken by the Ottawa Senators in the third round, at 93<sup>rd</sup> overall, after a memorable Minnesota high school season with the state runner-up Stillwater Ponies. Meanwhile, UConn commit **Brendan Dunphy** was picked in the seventh round at 207<sup>th</sup> overall by the Florida Panthers. The draft marked the first time since **Zach Benson's** first-round selection in 2023 that a player with Wenatchee ties had been selected in the NHL Draft.

## TWO OF A KIND:

Two team award winners remain with the Wild for the 2025-26 season after starring for the club a year ago. **Shaun Rios** was selected as Wenatchee's Rookie of the Year in his first season out of Shattuck-St. Mary's prep school in Minnesota, racking up 21 goals and 26 assists in 42 games for the Wild, while **Luka Shcherbyna** won a public fan vote to earn Fan Favorite, behind 49 points of his own.

## THE 700 CLUB:

Head coach **Don Nachbaur** is in his second year with the Wild reached the 700-win plateau in the WHL on November 20, 2024 against the Kelowna Rockets. Topping the WHL's all-time wins list is Don Hay, who won 750 games for Kamloops, Tri-City and Vancouver over 19 years, and is serving as associate coach of the Kelowna Rockets this season. Just behind Hay at 742 career wins is Ken Hodge, who spent 20 years as a WHL head coach with the original Edmonton Oil Kings and the Portland Winterhawks. Nachbaur is in his 21<sup>st</sup> season as a WHL head coach, spending all of that time with teams in Washington state. On November 14, he is set to break Ken Hodge's WHL record of 1,411 games coached.

## THE NEW KID(S) IN TOWN:

Last year's extension of NCAA eligibility to Canadian Hockey League players immediately made the WHL the destination of choice for players from the western half of the United States, and the Wild took great advantage of that new talent pool – of the 25 players on the team's opening-day roster, 15 were brand-new to the WHL. Six of those players are from Minnesota alone, four of whom played in the Class AA state final. Two – **Brandon Mickelson** and **Mason Kraft** – played for the state champion Moorhead Spuds, while two others – **Blake Vanek** and **Cal Conway** – suited up for the runner-up Stillwater Ponies. In all, 11 Wild players hail from the United States.

## MILESTONE WATCH:

With this year's influx of new talent, only seven returning players had at least one WHL goal under their belts going into the year, and neither goaltender on the Wild roster had previously appeared in a WHL game. **Luka Shcherbyna's** 80 career points tops the current Wild career list, though three other players (**Maddix McCagherty**, **Shaun Rios**, **Dawson Seitz**) also have an inside track to reach the century mark this year. Seitz is the only player on the Wenatchee roster to have already played in 200 career games, though **Josh Fluker** would get there himself should he appear in 53 contests this year.

## WENATCHEE'S ELEVEN:

11 players with ties to the Wild and ICE organizations began the 2025-26 season on National Hockey League rosters, headlined by **Sam Reinhart**, who led the Florida Panthers to their second straight Stanley Cup last season. All three first-rounders who joined the Wild upon the club's relocation to Wenatchee – **Zach Benson**, **Conor Geekie** and **Matt Savoie** – also started the season on an NHL roster, as did former Wild Junior "A" standouts **Nic Dowd**, **Harrison Scott** and **Devin Cooley**.

## SEVENTEEN AGAIN:

The Wild are being represented in in-season international competition as **Boston Tait** heads to the World Under-17 Hockey Challenge, scheduled for tomorrow through Saturday in Truro, Nova Scotia. Tait is in his first full WHL season, and played six games last year with a pair of assists as a Wild affiliate player, and was one of 80 players named to Canada's U17 Program of Excellence camp in July.

## THEIR STOCK IS RISING:

Three Wild players – **Caelan Joudrey**, **Darian Rolsing** and **Tobias Tvrtznik**, were selected for the NHL Central Scouting preliminary Players to Watch list on October 20. All received "C" ratings, indicating a likely fourth- or fifth-round selection in the 2026 NHL Draft.

## DON NACHBAUR

### HEAD COACH



The Wenatchee Wild are excited to welcome Don Nachbaur back to the Wild family for his second season as the team's head coach in 2025-26. He came

to Wenatchee after serving the previous three seasons as an American Hockey League assistant coach in the Calgary Flames organization for the Calgary Wranglers & Stockton Heat.

A native of Kitimat, British Columbia, Nachbaur has built an extensive and decorated coaching resume following a 15-year professional playing career. Prior to moving into the pro ranks, he played two seasons in the WHL with the Billings Bighorns, scoring 67 goals and 146 points from 1977 to 1979. He still shares the WHL record with a five-goal playoff game in 1978. Nachbaur was selected by the Hartford Whalers in the third round of the 1979 National Hockey League draft and played in nearly 900 professional contests, including 223 NHL games for the Whalers, Edmonton Oilers and Philadelphia Flyers. He also claimed an AHL Calder Cup in 1988 as a member of the Hershey Bears.

During a 31-year coaching career, Nachbaur has guided teams at the highest levels of the sport, including eight seasons as an assistant in the NHL and AHL, and two years as a head coach in Europe. He is also a proven winner as a Western Hockey League head coach and is especially familiar with the league's U.S. Division, with 20 seasons of experience as a bench boss with the Seattle Thunderbirds, Tri-City Americans and Spokane Chiefs in addition to the Wild. The third-winningest head coach in WHL history, Nachbaur earned his 700th WHL victory November 20, 2024 at the Kelowna Rockets, and has earned three Dunc McCallum Memorial Trophies as the WHL's Coach of the Year – he is the only coach in Canadian Hockey League history to earn his league's Coach of the Year honors for three different CHL teams. He has also enjoyed international success behind the bench, serving as an assistant coach for Canada at the 2012 World Junior Championships, and winning gold as an assistant coach for the Canadian under-18 team at the 1999 Nations Cup and 2011 Ivan Hlinka Memorial Tournament.

Nachbaur has family ties to the city of Wenatchee and the Wild organization, with son Daniel playing for the Wild in the British Columbia Hockey League in 2015-16 before embarking on a four-year NCAA playing career at UMass-Boston. Don and his wife Kim have two adult children, Sydney and Daniel.
