Wild/ICE All-Time Record vs. Prince Albert: 66-40-4-2

IN A NUTSHELL:

Wenatchee passes the quarter mark of the season and squeezes in a matchup with the East Division's top team as a four-game week continues.

THE SCENE-SETTER:

The Wild debuted four players in their lineup Friday, and nearly erased a three-goal Portland lead before dropping a 6-3 decision at the Winterhawks. Head coach **Don Nachbaur** made history upon the opening puck drop, becoming the WHL's longest-tenured coach in his 1,412th career game, and **Shaun Rios** put Wenatchee in front with a left-wing rip in transition just 47 seconds out of the chute. Sam Spehar put Portland in front with a pair of redirects, one at 16:27 of the first period and another 3:50 into the second. Aaron Zulinick scored on a backdoor one-timer 37 seconds later for a 3-1 lead, and the Winterhawks got a power play goal at 6:39 when a Wild clearing attempt toward the end glass ran away and past **Cal Conway**. **Mathias Silaban** cleaned up a rebound on **Brandon Osborne's** shot at 12:44 of the second period for his first WHL goal, and **Zane Torre** followed with one of his own at 17:54. However, Jordan Duguay buried a chance 74 seconds out of the break and Jake Gustafson scored at 9:30 of the third to close out the scoring. Silaban added an assist to his first WHL goal, while Spehar picked up an assist on top of his two goals.

KNOW YOUR FOE:

Prince Albert found itself in a battle with Seattle on Friday, edging the Thunderbirds 5-4 in overtime, with a topsy-turvy finish in Kent - Brock England and Coster Dunn scored in the first period to put Seattle ahead 2-0 at the recess, but Prince Albert answered back with an Aiden Oiring goal 59 seconds out of the break, and tied the game on a power play goal from Daxon Rudolph at 3:59. Jackson Kostiuik's goal halfway through the period put the Raiders in front going to the third, but Seattle grabbed the lead back on a goal at 4:40 from Antonio Martorana and a power play marker from Sawyer Mayes just past the halfway mark of the period. Oiring's goal with 1:09 to play tied the game, and the teams went without a shot in overtime until Linden Burrett's game-winner three-and-a-half minutes in. Oiring added an assist to his two goals, and Dimitri Fortin made 40 saves in the Raider victory. Prince Albert was the WHL's last team to lose a regulation game, at Tri-City last Saturday. The Raiders wrap up their U.S. Division trip this evening with a group that likes to get control early in the game - they are 11-0-1-0 when scoring first, and have won 12 of 13 when taking the lead to the third period.

THERE'S GOLD IN THEM THAR MEDALS:

Boston Tait returned Friday after being called to join Canada's best Under-17 players as part of last week's World U17 Hockey Challenge in Truro, Nova Scotia. Canada Red's alternate captain cranked out six assists in the weeklong event, with four in the quarterfinals against Sweden, helping his team claim a gold medal with a 6-3 win over Canada White last Saturday. This year marks the second straight that the two Canadian teams have faced off for gold, and the fourth in a row in which at least one Canadian team has medaled. Tait was one of 19 WHL players chosen for the tourney.

TRADING SPACES:

After a severe bite from the injury bug, the Wild acquired **Nolan Caffey** from the Everett Silvertips and **Zane Torre** from the Red Deer Rebels this week. Affiliate players **Nathan Crellin** from the Calgary Flames U18 team and **Devin Pelletier** of the CSHL's South Alberta Hockey Academy made their WHL debuts Friday as well. Six Wenatchee forwards, accounting for 22 of the team's first 40 goals of the season, were out of the lineup at Portland on Friday. Torre and Silaban buried their first WHL goals, bringing the total to seven Wild players who have scored their first WHL goals with the club this year. **Grady Wedman** contributed his first WHL goal to the Wenatchee cause in Tuesday's loss at Seattle.

1,412th NIGHT:

Wenatchee head coach **Don Nachbaur** made history last night, breaking the WHL record as its longest-tenured coach by coaching his 1,412th game in the league and passing longtime Portland Winterhawks bench boss Ken Hodge's record in the same Veterans Memorial Coliseum where Hodge set numerous records of his own and won 742 WHL games, helping the Winterhawks claim two Memorial Cups.

THIRD TIME'S THE CHARM:

The Wild organization has its eye on a return to the Western Hockey League playoffs in the Wenatchee Valley's third WHL season, after a near miss a year ago. Wenatchee closed out 2024-25 with a 23-36-8-1 record, taking ninth in the 11-team Western Conference, and did so following a second half with razor-thin margins – in their last 30 games, the Wild dropped 14 games by only a one- or two-goal margin, and went to overtime in five of six games at the middle of February. The team that caught them did so after catching fire in their second half – Seattle claimed the final playoff spot with 18 wins after January 10, including wins in six of their last eight games.

LET'S GO CAMPING:

Current Wenatchee player **Blake Vanek** earned a spot on the Ottawa Senators' training camp roster this fall after taking part in the Sens' rookie camp. Another player who started 2024-25 with the Wild, **Kenta Isogai**, earned a training camp slot with the Los Angeles Kings after being picked up by the team's American Hockey League affiliate, the Ontario Reign, late in the summer.

DRAFT DAY:

The Wild landed on the National Hockey League draft board twice in late June, with one incoming Wenatchee player selected alongside an outgoing standout. Forward **Blake Vanek** was taken by the Ottawa Senators in the third round, at 93rd overall, after a memorable Minnesota high school season with the state runner-up Stillwater Ponies. Meanwhile, UConn commit **Brendan Dunphy** was picked in the seventh round at 207th overall by the Florida Panthers. The draft marked the first time since **Zach Benson's** first-round selection in 2023 that a player with Wenatchee ties had been selected in the NHL Draft.

TWO OF A KIND:

Two team award winners remain with the Wild for the 2025-26 season after starring for the club a year ago. **Shaun Rios** was selected as Wenatchee's Rookie of the Year in his first season out of Shattuck-St. Mary's prep school in Minnesota, racking up 21 goals and 26 assists in 42 games for the Wild, while **Luka Shcherbyna** won a public fan vote to earn Fan Favorite, behind 49 points of his own.

THE 700 CLUB:

Head coach **Don Nachbaur** is in his second year with the Wild, reaching the 700-win plateau in the WHL on November 20, 2024 against the Kelowna Rockets. Topping the WHL's all-time wins list is Don Hay, who won 750 games for Kamloops, Tri-City and Vancouver over 19 years, and is serving as associate coach of the Kelowna Rockets this season. Just behind Hay at 742 career wins is Ken Hodge, who spent 20 years as a WHL head coach with the original Edmonton Oil Kings and the Portland Winterhawks. Nachbaur is in his 21st season as a WHL head coach, spending all of that time with teams in Washington state. He became the WHL's longest-tenured coach on November 14, 2025, stepping behind the bench for his 1,412th game.

THE NEW KID(S) IN TOWN:

Last year's extension of NCAA eligibility to Canadian Hockey League players immediately made the WHL the destination of choice for players from the western half of the United States, and the Wild took great advantage of that new talent pool – of the 25 players on the team's opening-day roster, 15 were brand-new to the WHL. Six of those players were from Minnesota alone, four of whom played in the Class AA state final. Two – **Brandon Mickelson** and **Mason Kraft** – played for the state champion Moorhead Spuds, while two others – **Blake Vanek** and **Cal Conway** – suited up for the runner-up Stillwater Ponies. In all, 12 current Wild players hail from the United States.

MILESTONE WATCH:

With this year's influx of new talent, only seven returning players had at least one WHL goal under their belts going into the year, and neither goaltender on the Wild roster had previously appeared in a WHL game. **Luka Shcherbyna's** 82 career points tops the current Wild career list, though three other players (**Maddix McCagherty**, **Shaun Rios**, **Dawson Seitz**) also have an inside track to reach the century mark this year. Seitz is the only player on the Wenatchee roster to have already played in 200 career games, though **Josh Fluker** would get there himself should he appear in 53 contests this year.

WENATCHEE'S ELEVEN:

11 players with ties to the Wild and ICE organizations began the 2025-26 season on National Hockey League rosters, headlined by **Sam Reinhart**, who led the Florida Panthers to their second straight Stanley Cup last season. All three first-rounders who joined the Wild upon the club's relocation to Wenatchee – **Zach Benson**, **Conor Geekie** and **Matt Savoie** – also started the season on an NHL roster, as did former Wild Junior "A" standouts **Nic Dowd**, **Harrison Scott** and **Devin Cooley**.

SEVENTEEN AGAIN:

The Wild were represented in in-season international competition in early November as **Boston Tait** won gold at the World Under-17 Hockey Challenge in Truro, Nova Scotia. Tait is in his first full WHL season, and played six games last year with a pair of assists as a Wild affiliate player, and was one of 80 players named to Canada's U17 Program of Excellence camp in July.

THEIR STOCK IS RISING:

Three Wild players – **Caelan Joudrey**, **Darian Rolsing** and **Tobias Tvrtznik**, were selected for the NHL Central Scouting preliminary Players to Watch list on October 20. All received "C" ratings, indicating a likely fourth- or fifth-round selection in the 2026 NHL Draft.

DON NACHBAUR

HEAD COACH



The Wenatchee Wild are excited to welcome Don Nachbaur back to the Wild family for his second season as the team's head coach in 2025-26. He came

to Wenatchee after serving the previous three seasons as an American Hockey League assistant coach in the Calgary Flames organization for the Calgary Wranglers & Stockton Heat.

A native of Kitimat, British Columbia, Nachbaur has built an extensive and decorated coaching resume following a 15-year professional playing career. Prior to moving into the pro ranks, he played two seasons in the WHL with the Billings Bighorns, scoring 67 goals and 146 points from 1977 to 1979. He still shares the WHL record with a five-goal playoff game in 1978. Nachbaur was selected by the Hartford Whalers in the third round of the 1979 National Hockey League draft and played in nearly 900 professional contests, including 223 NHL games for the Whalers, Edmonton Oilers and Philadelphia Flyers. He also claimed an AHL Calder Cup in 1988 as a member of the Hershey Bears.

During a 31-year coaching career, Nachbaur has guided teams at the highest levels of the sport, including eight seasons as an assistant in the NHL and AHL, and two years as a head coach in Europe. He is also a proven winner as a Western Hockey League head coach and is especially familiar with the league's U.S. Division, with 20 seasons of experience as a bench boss with the Seattle Thunderbirds, Tri-City Americans and Spokane Chiefs in addition to the Wild. The third-winningest head coach in WHL history, Nachbaur earned his 700th WHL victory November 20, 2024 at the Kelowna Rockets, and has earned three Dunc McCallum Memorial Trophies as the WHL's Coach of the Year – he is the only coach in Canadian Hockey League history to earn his league's Coach of the Year honors for three different CHL teams. He has also enjoyed international success behind the bench, serving as an assistant coach for Canada at the 2012 World Junior Championships, and winning gold as an assistant coach for the Canadian under-18 team at the 1999 Nations Cup and 2011 Ivan Hlinka Memorial Tournament.

Nachbaur has family ties to the city of Wenatchee and the Wild organization, with son Daniel playing for the Wild in the British Columbia Hockey League in 2015-16 before embarking on a four-year NCAA playing career at UMass-Boston. Don and his wife Kim have two adult children, Sydney and Daniel.
