NEWS & NOTES

TONIGHT'S GAME... The Spokane Chiefs have a chance at redemption against the Wenatchee Wild Sunday as they take on their divisional foe for the second straight night after losing 5-4 at home Saturday.

LAST GAME... The Spokane Chiefs opened the second half of the season on Saturday night following the league-wide holiday break, taking on the Wenatchee Wild in front of a sell-out of 10,407 rowdy Spokane Chiefs fans. Saturday marked Assanali Sarkenov's first game for Spokane since November 8th and Dominik Petr's Chiefs' debut following a trade with Saskatoon earlier this month. Less than a minute into the first period the Wild's Blake Vanek scored his 8th goal of the season with an assist from Riley Bassen. Spokane's first goal came at 12:52 into the first from Chase Harrington with an assist from Gavin Burcar. The goal was Harrington's 12th of the season, with Gavin Burcar picking up his 10th point of his rookie campaign on the assist. The Chiefs killed off an extended penalty later in the period before hitting intermission tied at one. Wenatchee's Zane Torre scored with an assist from Grady Wedman three minutes into the second to take the 2-1 lead. Coco Armstrong netted his 11th goal of the season at 6:05 with the assist going to veteran forward Sam Oremba. Armstrong's 11 goals on the season is a career high, good for 5th on the team so far this campaign. Spokane's newcomer Logan Wormald scored for the second consecutive game with an assist from Owen Martin at 10:52. Martin's saucer pass on the break fed Wormald for his team leading 15th of the season. The Wild came out hot in the third, scoring three goals in the first two and a half minutes. Riley Bassen, Nolan Caffey and Mason Kraft each found the net. Spokane pulled one back with Coco Armstrong scoring again at 17:38 with help from Logan Wormald and Rhett Sather but it was not enough as the Chiefs fall 5-4. Spokane led the shot count 38-21 over the Wild, going 3/3 on the penalty kill. Coco Armstrong was named third star after recording two goals. Logan Wormald also recorded two points with a goal and assist.

BEST IN THE WEST... Chiefs forwards Chase Harrington and Mathis Preston were named to Team West for the inaugural WHL Prospects Game presented by Showpass. Scheduled for Wednesday, February 18, the 2026 WHL Prospects Game will pit the most highly touted, NHL Draft-eligible prospects from the WHL's Eastern Conference against those from the WHL's Western Conference in a one-game battle for WHL supremacy in front of hundreds of NHL scouts and thousands of WHL fans. The showcase is the first all-WHL event of its kind since January 19, 2000, when Kelowna hosted the 2000 WHL All-Star Game.

WORLDWIDE SARKENOV... Spokane Chiefs 19-year-old import forward Assanali Sarkenov and Team Kazakhstan won silver this month at the Division I, Group A U20 World Championships in Slovenia. Kazakhstan finished with nine points in the tournament. Sarkenov wore the "C" for Team Kazakhstan and finished the tournament with five goals and three assists in four games - 12th in tournament scoring. Sarkenov played alongside his younger brother, Alisher, who is in his rookie season with the Prince Albert Raiders. Sarkenov is expected to return to Spokane for the Chiefs' first game back after the holiday break on Saturday, December 27 against the Wenatchee Wild.

THE GERMAN GENTLEMAN... Spokane Chiefs' German goaltender Linus Vieillard will represent his home country at the 2026 IIHF World Junior Championship. Vieillard, originally selected 57th overall by Spokane in this year's CHL Import Draft, will be playing for Team Germany in his second-straight WJC after posting a 2.66 GAA and a .915 SV% over three games in last

year's tournament. So far this season, the Berlin native has a 3.15 GAA and a .890 SV% in his 18 appearances (9-6-0-0).

TOP SHELF PROSPECTS... Chiefs forwards Mathis Preston and Chase Harrington represented Team CHL at the 2025 CHL USA Prospects Challenge in late November, which saw the top 2026 NHL Draft-eligible prospects from the WHL, OHL, and QMJHL face off against the U.S. National Under-18 Team in a two-game series hosted by the Calgary Hitmen and Lethbridge Hurricanes. This year's CHL roster featured 10 players from the OHL, eight from the WHL, and four from the QMJHL. Spokane was the only WHL club represented by two teammates. CHL and USA split the two-game series, with USA claiming victory in the second game's "super overtime" period to win the Challenge. Preston posted three points with a goal and two assists.

CHIEFS TO WATCH... Three Spokane Chiefs are among 89 WHL-developed players that have been named to NHL Central Scouting's Preliminary Players to Watch List ahead of the 2026 NHL Draft. Forward Mathis Preston received an 'A' rating (potential first-round), forward Chase Harrington received a 'B' rating (potential second- or third-round), and forward Brody Gillespie received a 'C' rating (potential fourth- or fifth-round).

BIG TIME CHIEFS... Seven Chiefs attended NHL training camps this fall, including F Berkly Catton (SEA), F Andrew Cristall (WSH), F Owen Martin (WPG), D Nathan Mayes (TOR), D Will McIsaac (STL), F Assanali Sarkenov (COL) and D Saige Weinstein (COL). Martin was selected 92nd overall by his hometown Winnipeg Jets this summer. Catton was selected by the Kraken eighth-overall at the 2024 NHL Entry Draft — the highest-selected Chief since Pat Falloon in 1991 (2nd overall – SJS). He signed a three-year entry-level contract with Seattle in July 2024. McIsaac was selected 145th overall by the Blues, while Mayes was selected by the Maple Leafs with the 225th pick in the 2024 NHL Entry Draft. Cristall was selected 40th overall by the Washington Capitals in 2023, while Weinstein signed a three-year entry-level contract with the Avalanche in October of that year as an undrafted free agent.

GOLD MEDAL GILLESPIE... Chiefs forward Brody Gillespie was among six WHL skaters that won gold for the United States at the 2025 Hlinka Gretzky Cup this summer. The Americans' 5-3 win over Sweden marked their first tournament championship since 2003 and second win in tournament history. Meanwhile, Chiefs forward Mathis Preston and goaltender Carter Esler were two of 11 WHLers who clinched bronze as Canada shut out Finland 3-0 in the bronze-medal game. Preston ranked second in scoring for Canada and fifth among all skaters with four goals and three assists in five outings, while Esler pitched a 14-save shutout in his one game.

BENCH BOSS BRAD... Spokane Chiefs head coach Brad Lauer will join Team Canada's coaching staff for the 2026 IIHF World Junior Championship in Minneapolis and St. Paul, Minnesota this December. Canada's coaching staff for the tournament is led by London Knights head coach Dale Hunter, who will be joined by associate coach Misha Donskov (London, ON), assistant coaches Lauer and Gardiner MacDougall (Moncton / QMJHL), goaltending coach Dan De Palma (Kamloops / WHL) and video coach Ethan O'Rourke (Kingston / OHL). In his first season with the Chiefs, Lauer led the team to the WHL Championship Series for the first time since 2008 and improved the team to a 45-20-1-2 record from 30-32-5-1 the year before.
