IN A NUTSHELL:

Wenatchee welcomes a visitor from the East Division at the outset of its U.S. Division road trip.

THE SCENE-SETTER:

The Wild have won four of six coming out of the Christmas break, and swept a weekend pair against the Portland Winterhawks, nailing down a 4-3 overtime win Sunday at Veterans Memorial Coliseum. Sunday's win checked a few boxes, getting one on the road in overtime, with a power play goal from **Riley Bassen**, and allowed only 30 shots on the net, the lowest single-game total allowed since December 13. **Mathias Silaban** ran off for a breakaway goal 3:38 into the game, but Portland went to the dressing room tied 1-1 thanks to a Sam Spehar goal with 2:48 to play in the period, and took the lead at 32 seconds on a jam-shot from Jordan Duguay. **Alex Andre** posted his first WHL goal with 3:23 to go in the period, scoring on a wrist shot from the left wing, but Carter Sotheran walked the puck through the left circle with 25 seconds to play in the period to put the Winterhawks ahead again. Bassen's goal came on a second chance 2:29 into the third, punching in a rebound off a shot from **Nolan Caffey**. The overtime session took all of 19 seconds – **Josh Toll's** shot sneaked by Cruz Chase from the top corner of the slot to give the Wild their third straight overtime victory. Bassen finished with a goal and two assists, and **Tobias Tvrznik** earned his 11th win of the season behind 27 saves.

KNOW YOUR FOE:

Moose Jaw begins its six-game trip south of the border, and does so looking to shake a string of 10 losses over its last 12 games. The Warriors have fallen victim back-to-back nights to a Medicine Hat team that has posted standings points in 19 straight games, and wins in 15 in a row. The Tigers scored a 5-1 win Saturday, starting with a goal from Liam Ruck 6:37 into the game. Colt Carter tied the game with 12 seconds remaining in the period, but Cam Parr and Tyson Moss scored four minutes apart in the second to put Medicine Hat ahead for good. Noah Davidson scored for the visitors at 5:41, followed by Moss's seventh goal at 8:21. Kyle Jones stopped 31 Medicine Hat shots in the loss, while the Warriors and Tigers each managed a power play goal, and Medicine Hat finished with a 36-20 shots advantage. The Warriors' penalty kill is third from the bottom of the league at under 69 percent, but they have netted six shorthanded goals, good for fourth on the circuit.

THE BOOK OF NUMBERS:

In Sunday's game against the Winterhawks, the Wild reached the four-goal mark for the 12th time this year, with a 11-0-1-0 record when scoring at least four in a game. Three-goal games have been a toss-up (3-3-0-1), but the Wild are 1-18 when scoring two or fewer. Wenatchee has also gone 40-for-46 (87 percent) on the penalty kill over the last 12 games, climbing back to the top of the league in that category.

TALKING TRADES:

The club made a trio of moves this past week ahead of Thursday evening's trade deadline, starting with a deal to move Blake Vanek to the Calgary Hitmen for the rights to Lakeville South High School senior Carter Ernst, and a sixth-round pick in the 2029 WHL Prospects Draft. Wenatchee picked up Kelowna forward **Levi Benson** for a pair of draft picks Wednesday evening, but Dawson Seitz was traded to Prince George Thursday afternoon for a 2029 WHL draft pick. The club comes out of the trade deadline with two of its three available 20-year-old slots filled following Seitz's move.

WANNA BE LIKE MIKE:

Defenseman **Michal Capos** has returned after taking part in Slovakia's entry in the World Junior Championships in Minneapolis and St. Paul. Capos was one of eight defensemen and three WHL players on the Slovakian roster, which saw its run at the tournament end Friday with a 7-1 loss to Canada. The Slovakian team was seeking its first medal since finishing with the bronze medal in the 2015 tournament in Toronto and Montreal.

ONE MORE TO ONE HUNDRED:

Luka Shcherbyna has moved to within a single point of 100 for his WHL career, with 158 of his 160 appearances coming in a Wild uniform. Shcherbyna joined the club ahead of the 2023-24 season, playing in two previous WHL games as an affiliate player for the Spokane Chiefs.

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THIRD TIME'S THE CHARM:

The Wild organization has its eye on a return to the Western Hockey League playoffs in the Wenatchee Valley's third WHL season, after a near miss a year ago. Wenatchee closed out 2024-25 with a 23-36-8-1 record, taking ninth in the 11-team Western Conference, and did so following a second half with razor-thin margins – in their last 30 games, the Wild dropped 14 games by only a one- or two-goal margin, and went to overtime in five of six games at the middle of February. The team that caught them did so after catching fire in their second half – Seattle claimed the final playoff spot with 18 wins after January 10, including wins in six of their last eight games.

DRAFT DAY:

The Wild landed on the National Hockey League draft board twice in late June, with one incoming Wenatchee player selected alongside an outgoing standout. **Blake Vanek** started the season with the Wild after being taken by the Ottawa Senators in the third round, at 93rd overall, following a memorable Minnesota high school season with the state runner-up Stillwater Ponies. Meanwhile, UConn commit **Brendan Dunphy** was picked in the seventh round at 207th overall by the Florida Panthers. The draft marked the first time since **Zach Benson's** first-round selection in 2023 that a player with Wenatchee ties had been selected in the NHL Draft.

ONE OF A KIND:

One team award winner remains with the Wild for the 2025-26 season after starring for the club a year ago. **Luka Shcherbyna** won a public fan vote to earn Fan Favorite, behind 49 points, the team's leading returning scorer for 2025-26.

THE 700 CLUB:

Head coach **Don Nachbaur** is in his second year with the Wild, reaching the 700-win plateau in the WHL on November 20, 2024 against the Kelowna Rockets. Topping the WHL's all-time wins list is Don Hay, who won 752 games for Kamloops, Tri-City and Vancouver over 19 years, and is serving as associate coach of the Kelowna Rockets this season. Just behind Hay at 742 career wins is Ken Hodge, who spent 20 years as a WHL head coach with the original Edmonton Oil Kings and the Portland Winterhawks. Nachbaur is in his 21st season as a WHL head coach, spending all of that time with teams in Washington state. He became the WHL's longest-tenured coach on November 14, 2025, stepping behind the bench for his 1,412th game.

THE NEW KID(S) IN TOWN:

Last year's extension of NCAA eligibility to Canadian Hockey League players immediately made the WHL the destination of choice for players from the western half of the United States, and the Wild took great advantage of that new talent pool – of the 25 players on the team's opening-day roster, 15 were brand-new to the WHL. Six of those players were from Minnesota alone, four of whom played in the Class AA state final. Two – **Brandon Mickelson** and **Mason Kraft** – played for the state champion Moorhead Spuds, while two others – **Blake Vanek** and **Cal Conway** – suited up for the runner-up Stillwater Ponies. In all, 10 current full-time Wild players hail from the U.S.

MILESTONE WATCH:

With this year's influx of new talent, only seven returning players had at least one WHL goal under their belts going into the year, and neither goaltender on the Wild roster had previously appeared in a WHL game. **Luka Shcherbyna** now sits just one point away from 100 for his WHL career, and reached the 150-game mark in his WHL career on December 12. **Caelan Joudrey** hit the 100-game mark on December 7 at Calgary.

WENATCHEE'S ELEVEN:

11 players with ties to the Wild and ICE organizations began the 2025-26 season on National Hockey League rosters, headlined by **Sam Reinhart**, who led the Florida Panthers to their second straight Stanley Cup last season. All three first-rounders who joined the Wild upon the club's relocation to Wenatchee – **Zach Benson**, **Conor Geekie** and **Matt Savoie** – also started the season on an NHL roster, as did former Wild Junior "A" standouts **Nic Dowd**, **Harrison Scott** and **Devin Cooley**.

AN INTERNATIONAL FLAVOR:

The Wild were represented in in-season international competition in early November as **Boston Tait** won gold at the World Under-17 Hockey Challenge in Truro, Nova Scotia. Tait is in his first full WHL season, and played six games last year with a pair of assists as a Wild affiliate player, and was one of 80 players named to Canada's U17 Program of Excellence camp in July. **Michal Capos** was also selected for international play this season, helping the Slovaks reach the quarterfinals at the 2026 World Junior Championships in Minnesota.

THEIR STOCK IS RISING:

Three Wild players – **Caelan Joudrey**, **Darian Rolsing** and **Tobias Tvrtznik**, were selected for the NHL Central Scouting preliminary Players to Watch list on October 20. All received "C" ratings, indicating a likely fourth- or fifth-round selection in the 2026 NHL Draft.

DON NACHBAUR



HEAD COACH

The Wenatchee Wild are excited to welcome Don Nachbaur back to the Wild family for his second season as the team's head coach in 2025-26. He came to Wenatchee after serving the previous three seasons as an American Hockey League assistant coach in the Calgary Flames organization for the Calgary Wranglers & Stockton Heat.

A native of Kitimat, British Columbia, Nachbaur has built an extensive and decorated coaching resume following a 15-year professional playing career. Prior to moving into the pro ranks, he played two seasons in the WHL with the Billings Bighorns, scoring 67 goals and 146 points from 1977 to 1979. He still shares the WHL record with a five-goal playoff game in 1978. Nachbaur was selected by the Hartford Whalers in the third round of the 1979 National Hockey League draft and played in nearly 900 professional contests, including 223 NHL games for the Whalers, Edmonton Oilers and Philadelphia Flyers. He also claimed an AHL Calder Cup in 1988 as a member of the Hershey Bears.

During a 31-year coaching career, Nachbaur has guided teams at the highest levels of the sport, including eight seasons as an assistant in the NHL and AHL, and two years as a head coach in Europe. He is also a proven winner as a Western Hockey League head coach and is especially familiar with the league's U.S. Division, with 20 seasons of experience as a bench boss with the Seattle Thunderbirds, Tri-City Americans and Spokane Chiefs in addition to the Wild. The longest-tenured and third-winningest head coach in WHL history, Nachbaur earned his 700th WHL victory November 20, 2024 at the Kelowna Rockets, and has earned three Dunc McCallum Memorial Trophies as the WHL's Coach of the Year – he is the only coach in Canadian Hockey League history to earn his league's Coach of the Year honors for three different CHL teams. He has also enjoyed international success behind the bench, serving as an assistant coach for Canada at the 2012 World Junior Championships, and winning gold as an assistant coach for the Canadian under-18 team at the 1999 Nations Cup and 2011 Ivan Hlinka Memorial Tournament.

Nachbaur has family ties to the city of Wenatchee and the Wild organization, with son Daniel playing for the Wild in the British Columbia Hockey League in 2015-16 before embarking on a four-year NCAA playing career at UMass-Boston. Don and his wife Kim have two adult children, Sydney and Daniel.
