Wild/ICE All-Time Record vs. Kelowna: 26-24-3-0 (3 ties) - 57th regular-season meeting

IN A NUTSHELL:

Wenatchee wraps up the month by wrapping up its season series with the end of a home-and-home against the upcoming Memorial Cup hosts.

THE SCENE-SETTER:

The Wild knocked in the first goal in their Friday night affair against the Kelowna Rockets, but the later goals they needed never came in a 5-1 defeat at Prospera Place. Wenatchee notched its lone goal at 7:01 of the first period, just 19 seconds into its first power play, as **Luka Shcherbyna** fired a shot from the right point that popped up for **Caelan Joudrey** to bat in at the goal line. Kelowna retook the lead before the break, on a rebound marker from Carson Wetsch at 16:31 and Mazden Leslie's goal from the slot 2:40 later. Nate Corbet's goal off a Hayden Paupanekis drop pass doubled the lead at 4:27 of the second, and doubled the lead again in the third with a pair of early goals - Wetsch tapped in his own rebound off the glass at 3:32 of the final stanza, and Connor Pankratz scored 35 seconds later to close out the night. Wetsch led the offense with a pair of goals, while Pankratz, Leslie and Corbet each ended up with a goal and an assist. Harrison Boettiger stopped 25 of 26 shots, earning his 21st win of the season, while **Cal Conway** took the loss in a 32-save effort. Both teams finished the night 1-for-4 on the power play.

KNOW YOUR FOE:

Kelowna has morphed into the Western Conference's hottest team at the end of February, with wins in six straight - the Rockets opened this week with a 4-1 Wednesday win against the Seattle Thunderbirds, getting first-period goals from Mazden Leslie and Carson Wetsch before seeing Antonio Martorana put the Thunderbirds on the board with 1:01 left. Seattle put up 11 of the 15 shots in the second period, but failed to even up the score - Tij Iginla gave the Rockets some extra breathing room on a goal with 7:15 to play, and Owen Folstrom put the game away with an empty-net goal with 1:43 to go. Wetsch, Iginla and Leslie each had a goal and an assist, while Harrison Boettiger picked up 25 saves on 26 shots, and the penalty-killing units were perfect on seven chances. With 36 shots per night, the Rockets bring in the second-fastest-paced offense in the Western Hockey League - only Everett posts more shots on goal per night. Kelowna also features the league's most dangerous penalty kill, with a dozen shorthanded goals, and seven NHL draft picks - Boettiger is also the seventh-ranked North American goaltender in the NHL Central Scouting midterm rankings.

PLAYOFF PICTURE:

Wenatchee remains nine points back of a Western Conference playoff spot with 10 games to play. Most games in hand have now been settled, with Seattle only having played one fewer game than the Wild. Though the Western Conference race has begun to separate itself somewhat, the fifth through 10th positions are still decided by a mere eight points.

THE SCORING RACE:

As February ends, **Josh Toll** remains six points ahead of **Luka Shcherbyna** as the top Wild scorer, and **Mason Kraft** is nine points back after a six-game point streak ended last Saturday. Toll and Prince Albert defenseman Daxon Rudolph are the only WHL blueliners to lead their teams in scoring.

CAELAN'S CONSISTENCY:

With 10 games remaining in the regular season, **Caelan Joudrey** is the last remaining Wild player going for an "Iron Man" designation - he played in eight straight games to wrap up last season, putting him at 66 consecutive games in the Wenatchee lineup. He notched 45 straight games last season as well, and has appeared in 124 of 126 games in his first two full junior seasons. Since January 1, Joudrey has not gone more than three games without registering at least one point, and has landed on the scoresheet in 11 of the last 15 games.

AID-ING THE OFFENSE:

Aiden Grossklous's assist last Saturday placed him back on the score sheet for the third time in four games - it was his first stretch with points of three in four since a three-game point streak in early November. He also has the club's best singular night of the season, with a goal and four assists in Wenatchee's 9-4 win January 16 against Portland.

THIRD TIME'S THE CHARM:

The Wild organization has its eye on a return to the Western Hockey League playoffs in the Wenatchee Valley's third WHL season, after a near miss a year ago. Wenatchee closed out 2024-25 with a 23-36-8-1 record, taking ninth in the 11-team Western Conference, and did so following a second half with razor-thin margins - in their last 30 games, the Wild dropped 14 games by only a one- or two-goal margin, and went to overtime in five of six games at the middle of February. The team that caught them did so after catching fire in their second half - Seattle claimed the final playoff spot with 18 wins after January 10, including wins in six of their last eight games.

DRAFT DAY:

The Wild landed on the National Hockey League draft board twice in late June, with one incoming Wenatchee player selected alongside an outgoing standout. **Blake Vanek** started the season with the Wild after being taken by the Ottawa Senators in the third round, at 93rd overall, following a memorable Minnesota high school season with the state runner-up Stillwater Ponies. Meanwhile, UConn commit **Brendan Dunphy** was picked in the seventh round at 207th overall by the Florida Panthers. The draft marked the first time since **Zach Benson's** first-round selection in 2023 that a player with Wenatchee ties had been selected in the NHL Draft.

ONE OF A KIND:

One team award winner remains with the Wild for the 2025-26 season after starring for the club a year ago. **Luka Shcherbyna** won a public fan vote to earn Fan Favorite, behind 49 points, the team's leading returning scorer for 2025-26.

THE 700 CLUB:

Head coach **Don Nachbaur** is in his second year with the Wild, reaching the 700-win plateau in the WHL on November 20, 2024 against the Kelowna Rockets. Topping the WHL's all-time wins list is Don Hay, who won 752 games for Kamloops, Tri-City and Vancouver over 19 years, and is serving as associate coach of the Kelowna Rockets this season. Just behind Hay at 742 career wins is Ken Hodge, who spent 20 years as a WHL head coach with the original Edmonton Oil Kings and the Portland Winterhawks. Nachbaur is in his 21st season as a WHL head coach, spending all of that time with teams in Washington state. He became the WHL's longest-tenured coach on November 14, 2025, stepping behind the bench for his 1,412th game.

THE NEW KID(S) IN TOWN:

Last year's extension of NCAA eligibility to Canadian Hockey League players immediately made the WHL the destination of choice for players from the western half of the United States, and the Wild took great advantage of that new talent pool - of the 25 players on the team's opening-day roster, 15 were brand-new to the WHL. Six of those players were from Minnesota alone, four of whom played in the Class AA state final. Two - **Brandon Mickelson** and **Mason Kraft** - played for the state champion Moorhead Spuds, while two others - **Blake Vanek** and **Cal Conway** - suited up for the runner-up Stillwater Ponies. In all, 10 current full-time Wild players hail from the U.S.

MILESTONE WATCH:

With this year's influx of new talent, only seven returning players had at least one WHL goal under their belts going into the year, and neither goaltender on the Wild roster had previously appeared in a WHL game. **Luka Shcherbyna** reached the 100-point mark for his WHL career January 11 at Vancouver, and reached the 150-game mark in his WHL career on December 12 against Tri-City. **Caelan Joudrey** hit the 100-game mark on December 7 at Calgary, and Levi Benson earned his 100th on February 14 at Spokane, while **Zane Saab** played in his 150th WHL game January 30 at Portland.

WENATCHEE'S ELEVEN:

11 players with ties to the Wild and ICE organizations began the 2025-26 season on National Hockey League rosters, headlined by **Sam Reinhart**, who led the Florida Panthers to their second straight Stanley Cup last season. All three NHL first-rounders who joined the Wild upon the club's relocation to Wenatchee - **Zach Benson**, **Conor Geekie** and **Matt Savoie** - also started the season on an NHL roster, as did former Wild Junior "A" standouts **Nic Dowd**, **Harrison Scott** and **Devin Cooley**.

AN INTERNATIONAL FLAVOR:

In early November, **Boston Tait** won gold at the World Under-17 Hockey Challenge in Truro, Nova Scotia - Tait is in his first full WHL season, and played six games last year with a pair of assists as a Wild affiliate player. **Michal Capos** was also selected for international play this season, helping the Slovaks reach the quarterfinals at the 2026 World Junior Championships in Minnesota.

PULLING RANK:

Three Wild players - **Caelan Joudrey**, **Darian Rolsing** and **Tobias Tvrznik**, were chosen for the NHL Central Scouting midterm rankings on January 12 - Tvrznik was ranked fifth among draft-eligible goalies playing in North America, and second among WHL netminders. Joudrey was ranked 101st among North American skaters, while Rolsing was placed 158th. All three were also picked for the preliminary Players to Watch list on October 20. All received "C" ratings, indicating a likely fourth- or fifth-round selection in the 2026 NHL Draft.

THEIR PROSPECTS ARE GOOD:

Caelan Joudrey and **Darian Rolsing** competed in the WHL Prospects Game presented by Showpass on February 18, with Joudrey logging an assist, while **Tobias Tvrznik** was forced out due to injury. All three are on the NHL Central Scouting midterm rankings list.

DON NACHBAUR

HEAD COACH



The Wenatchee Wild are excited to welcome Don Nachbaur back to the Wild family for his second season as the team's head coach in 2025-26. He came

to Wenatchee after serving the previous three seasons as an American Hockey League assistant coach in the Calgary Flames organization for the Calgary Wranglers & Stockton Heat.

A native of Kitimat, British Columbia, Nachbaur has built an extensive and decorated coaching resume following a 15-year professional playing career. Prior to moving into the pro ranks, he played two seasons in the WHL with the Billings Bighorns, scoring 67 goals and 146 points from 1977 to 1979. He still shares the WHL record with a five-goal playoff game in 1978. Nachbaur was selected by the Hartford Whalers in the third round of the 1979 National Hockey League draft and played in nearly 900 professional contests, including 223 NHL games for the Whalers, Edmonton Oilers and Philadelphia Flyers. He also claimed an AHL Calder Cup in 1988 as a member of the Hershey Bears.

During a 31-year coaching career, Nachbaur has guided teams at the highest levels of the sport, including eight seasons as an assistant in the NHL and AHL, and two years as a head coach in Europe. He is also a proven winner as a Western Hockey League head coach and is especially familiar with the league's U.S. Division, with 20 seasons of experience as a bench boss with the Seattle Thunderbirds, Tri-City Americans and Spokane Chiefs in addition to the Wild. The longest-tenured and third-winningest head coach in WHL history, Nachbaur earned his 700th WHL victory November 20, 2024 at the Kelowna Rockets, and has earned three Dunc McCallum Memorial Trophies as the WHL's Coach of the Year - he is the only coach in Canadian Hockey League history to earn his league's Coach of the Year honors for three different CHL teams. He has also enjoyed international success behind the bench, serving as an assistant coach for Canada at the 2012 World Junior Championships, and winning gold as an assistant coach for the Canadian under-18 team at the 1999 Nations Cup and 2011 Ivan Hlinka Memorial Tournament.

Nachbaur has family ties to the city of Wenatchee and the Wild organization, with son Daniel playing for the Wild in the British Columbia Hockey League in 2015-16 before embarking on a four-year NCAA playing career at UMass-Boston. Don and his wife Kim have two adult children, Sydney and Daniel.
